Frank William Coleman, 83, of Jamestown, was pronounced dead on arrival at a local who worked both for Zane hospital last night after apparently suffering a heart attack. Mr. Coleman had a

history of heart trouble, according to Lt Ray filmed locally Antonini, chief deputy Mr. Coleman made his coroner.

Driving the Columbia stage line was also a parttime job for Mr. Coleman, Orr; former owner of the stage, and current owner Louie Gookin. Mr. Coleman was frequently stage driver in movies

31 years, died Wednesday in a local hospital.


